Jae Fox is working for the Ford Motor Car Company. It seems that he is busy designing motors for them.


Patty Van Wagnen and Barbara Jenkins have an interior Decorating business in Detroit. I seem to remember that both of the girls were married not so long ago.


In 1949, The Wildcats played four games of which they won 2 and lost 2.






In the fall of 1950 the Band marched at several football games In December we had our annual Christmas Concert supplemented by some Christmas carols by the Junior Band.




